The way we act and how we behave towards others should be a way of encouraging them to become part of God's family – the Church! It is your job and mine to promote the gospel and make God's glory known to others. If we do not do so, then we are failing God himself.

People could become followers of Christ because of our example. We must go out and 'ad' more to his family. How can we do this? By being ourselves as we witness to others. Every Sunday we say, 'Your kingdom come, your will be done,' in the Lord's Prayer, but if Jesus were to come again TODAY, would we be READY? What type of Christians are we? What kind of AD? #### Bible Notes (42)



#### Some Bible Birds Daniel Pearson





Psalms 84:3 'The sparrows have found a home, and the swallows have nests. They raise their young near your altars, LORD All-Powerful, my King and my God'.

The swallow is considered as

a beacon of hope. A small Bird with a wingspan of 320 to 350mm and a weight of 16-25g. It is the most aerobatic of birds, spending most of it life in flight. Swallows are insectivorous, taking flying insects on the wing and drinks as they skims over the

surface of ponds or rivers.

Proverbs 26:2 'Curses will not harm someone who is innocent. They are like sparrows or swallows that fly around and never land'.

Storks represent peace, happiness, fertility, birth and rebirth Psalms 104:16-17 'The trees of the LORD are full of sap; the cedars of Lebanon, which he hath planted; Where the birds make their nests: as for the stork, the fir trees are her house'.



Storks range from about 60 cm to more than 150 cm (2 to 5 feet) in height. All or part of the head and upper neck may be bare of feathers and brightly coloured. Storks are nearly voiceless but some of them clatter their bills loudly when excited. They fly, alternately flapping and soaring, with neck outstretched and legs trailing. Storks occur mainly in Africa, Asia, and Europe.

The **stork** is fearless of man and known for their tender love between mated pairs and for their young. It is seen to shield its fledglings by using an outstretched wing as a defence against predators.

The account of the quail in Exodus 16:13-14 'That evening, quail came and covered the camp' serves as a reminder of God's miraculous provision and the importance of trusting in Him to meet our needs, even when the situation seems impossible. It also underscores the theme of gratitude and reliance on God's

provision throughout the Israelites' journey to the Promised Land.
Rarely seen in Wales or the west of England, there are only 350 breading pairs in the UK. They migrate from Africa along two routes; the eastern passage takes then, in the early spring across the Red Sea. At this stage the birds are exhausted and even today the Bedouins catch the birds by hand.

Birds are delightfully coloured and of all shapes and sizes and are used throughout the Bible as illustrations and examples. They encourage us with their song and Psalm 104:12-14 tells us of this precious gift of creation:

The birds of the sky nest by the waters;
they sing among the branches.

He waters the mountains from his upper chambers;
the land is satisfied by the fruit of his work.

He makes grass grow for the cattle,
and plants for people to cultivate—
bringing forth food from the earth:

### MISSION FOCUS: The Story of the BMS Part 4 Reaching into China

In the early 1800s, the pioneering work of William Carey and his fellow missionaries in India was amazingly effective. Back in the UK, the amazing and inspiring achievements of the missionaries were stimulating great interest and a desire to reach the wider world with the gospel. The land of China, however, remained a land of mystery and a closed door to people in the West, and China's protectionist government was doing all in its power to resist the influence and pressure of Western imperialism.

By the mid-1800s, times were changing, and China (unwillingly) signed a series of treaties with Western powers, including Great Britain, which opened Chinese ports like Shanghai, to foreign trade. Along with traders, missionaries came, including men like James Hudson Taylor, who began the China Inland Mission, in 1854. Over 90 years, nearly 400 BMS missionaries travelled to the vast country of China to carry out evangelism, establish churches and medical missions, organise famine relief, set up schools and colleges, and translate and distribute the Bible and Christian literature.

One of the early BMS missionaries to China was 25-year-old Timothy Richard - a Welshman from Carmarthen - in 1870. Richard first worked in the trading port of Yantai, then decided to move inland in 1875, to work in the walled city of Qing Zhon, with its large population of 30,000 people. He soon realised what a huge cultural gap there was between himself and the Chinese nationals so he, like Hudson Taylor, decided to adapt his lifestyle to the customs of the Chinese, and take a Chinese name, and wear Chinese-style clothes. He also mastered the language and so was able to share the gospel through the local custom of story-telling in public places. This method brought great results and after two years there had been over 300 baptisms, and a thousand enquirers were keeping him, his fellow missionaries, and the local Chinese pastor very busy!

Despite these encouragements, the missionaries faced many challenges including health problems caused by the climate and local infectious diseases. Many missionaries died and at one point Timothy Richard found himself the sole BMS representative in China. In addition to this, the worst famine in modern China broke out in the north of the country in 1876, caused by a severe drought that lasted for 3 years. It is estimated

that as many as 13 million people may have perished, despite the valiant efforts of Timothy Richard and many other missionaries in organising the famine relief effort and bringing in massive amounts of funding from overseas. This missionary-led famine relief was one of the first major programmes of humanitarian aid in modern history.

Despite all the good work done by the missionaries, they still faced much opposition. Many of the Chinese associated the missionaries with Western imperialism and resented them, especially those from the educated classes who feared changes that might threaten their position. As the foreign and missionary presence grew, so did Chinese resentment. By 1900, a wave of anti-foreign feeling began to sweep across China amongst the peasants which became known as the Boxer Rebellion. It was the worst disaster in missionary history and resulted in the deaths of thousands of Chinese Christians as well as 189 Protestant missionaries, 12 of whom were BMS workers. Children of missionaries were also killed.

Despite this persecution, the church continued to grow, and the BMS expanded its work by distributing literature, and setting up schools and one of the first universities in China. Timothy Richard was appointed by the local governor of Shanxi province to be the university's first chancellor, and although it was forbidden to teach Christianity, Richard as Chancellor was able to appoint numerous Christian missionaries on the teaching staff. By the late 1920s and 30s, the persecution intensified, and many more Christians were martyred for their faith. Droughts, famines, and the Japanese invasion of China in 1937 made the life of missionaries even more difficult, but once again they gave themselves to organising famine relief, feeding thousands of people, housing orphans and training pastors, and the church continued to grow.

Finally, the Chinese People's Republic which was set up in 1949 brought an end to the BMS work, as all mission workers were forced to withdraw. The last missionaries left China by 1952, but the seeds of the gospel they sowed so faithfully are continuing to bear fruit to this day. Despite increased surveillance of the population, the many oppressive laws, and severe persecution, the number of believers, mainly meeting together in secret, continues to grow, and it is estimated that there are almost 100 million Christians in China today.

#### **Switch that Light off?!**

Everyone is aware of the cost-of-living crisis, and we all want to know, what can we do to help ourselves save energy and money, both at home and at church? Prices for gas and electricity are still much higher than they were, and many are additionally concerned by the ending of the Winter Fuel Allowance. So what can we do to help ourselves? This is an edited version of the article that Keith wrote in November 2022:

One thing is for sure, as we move forward into autumn and winter, we will need comfortable and warm buildings. Therein lies the question - just how warm? Age Concern recommend  $21^{\circ}$ C in the living room and  $18^{\circ}$ C in the bedroom as optimum settings. Realistic data from energy companies show that most homes are heated well above these settings, commonly up to  $25^{\circ}$ C. If our room settings are higher than the above recommended figures, by turning the thermostat down by just  $1^{\circ}$ C would, according to the energy companies, save upwards of £100 a year at the original rates. Well worth thinking about at home. And in the Church Hall, may I ask all users to resist the temptation to turn up the thermostat; it is set at a level to keep us comfortable at all our meetings.

We all know the saying 'Time is money,' and there lies another major point. If we are cooking, for example, how often do we NOT turn the heat off until the very end? Ovens retain heat for a considerable time, as does a liquid that has boiled. Turning off, only a few minutes earlier, will save a considerable amount over a year. Electric kettles are normally 2 litre capacity and 3 kilowatts power. Prior to the price rises, the cost to boil a full kettle was approximately 6p in 4 minutes; half full, 3p in 2 minutes; quarter full 1½p in 1 minute. Many of us fill up a kettle rather than only boil what is required – but 'Look after the pennies and the pounds will look after themselves'. At home, or in church, turn off the heat or switch down some time prior to leaving the relevant room, not when you leave. The earlier you do, the greater the saving.

These observations apply equally to homes and businesses. A little more thought as to what is required can make a considerable difference. As is said in my all-time favourite comedy series, 'This time next year we'll be millionaires!'
