Greetings from... Jill Morley

Greetings to all our readers as we begin the second month of 2025!

I hope that the year has started well for you, and that you're looking forward positively to all that lies ahead. But maybe some of you are feeling weighed down with the demands and pressures of life, or anxious about things to come. For us all, hearing the news of what is happening in the world each day can be depressing and distressing!

I recently read an article about the anxieties and concerns people felt in 1939, just a few months after the start of the Second World War, when our nation was facing a most terrible evil. One lady mentioned that she had been unable to sleep for fear of what may come upon us, as news came of Hitler's armies sweeping into Poland with their sights set on conquering the whole of Europe. Whatever would become of us when up against such an aggressive and determined foe?

At this time of immense challenge and sense of foreboding, what we needed above all was great courage and strong faith, and both these qualities were demonstrated by a man who could hardly put a sentence together due to his severe stammer, yet whose faith and courage inspired the nation – King George VI. In his Christmas radio broadcast to the nation at the end of 1939, he finished with these words....

'A new year is at hand. We can't tell what it will bring. If it brings peace, how thankful we shall be. If it brings us continued struggle, we shall remain undaunted. In the meantime, I feel we might all find a message of encouragement in the lines which, in my closing words, I should like to say to you: "And I said to the man who stood at the gate of the year: 'Give me a light that I may tread safely into the unknown.' And he replied, 'Go out into the darkness and put your hand into the hand of God. That shall be better to you than light, and safer than a known way." May that Almighty hand guide and uphold us all. Amen.'

King George's message must have been such a source of strength and encouragement to our nation. My own grandmother had these words framed and on her mantelpiece for the rest of her life. As a child I loved to read them as they gave me comfort and hope too, for its message applies to us all, in every generation.

God's hand is stretched out in love and care to all who reach out to Him, and whilst none of us knows what the year ahead may bring, He does, and He says to us "Do not fear, for I am with you; do not be dismayed, for I am your God. I will strengthen you and help you; I will uphold you with my righteous right hand." (Isaiah 41:10)

Well over 300 years ago, the author of the famous book *Pilgrim's Progress* was having to endure a very trying ordeal. He had been sentenced to twelve years in prison in Bedford jail, for the 'crime' of preaching his non-conformist beliefs when ordered to stop. During those twelve long, hard years, he was separated from his young wife and four children, but kept up his morale by studying, writing and preaching to his fellow prisoners. The Lord was with him through it all, and gave him the strength to endure with patience and courage. That strength and courage still come through in the words he wrote to the hymn known as "To be a Pilgrim"...

He who would valiant be 'gainst all disaster, Let him in constancy follow the Master. There's no discouragement shall make him once relent His first avowed intent to be a pilgrim.

John Bunyan saw himself as a pilgrim on the journey through life and, like him, all of us on our journey are often stretched and our faith tested, sometimes to the limit. We have to learn endurance and perseverance through our trials and battles, but through all life's twists and turns, the ups and downs, times of joy and times of pain, our character is forged, and one thing is certain – our God has promised to travel the journey with us, every single step of the way, and then bring us safely to our eternal home!

Warm Space and Warm Welcome News

This newsletter went to be printed just before the Upper Trosnant Warm Space held its special meeting to 'Banish Blue Monday'. We hope to report next time on the warm atmosphere created by brightly coloured balloons and cakes, and, even more importantly, by the warm friendship and conversation with others.

Just a reminder that Warm Space is open every Monday afternoon between 2 and 4 pm. It is not a 'religious meeting' and absolutely anyone, of all faiths or none, is invited to come along, either to stay all afternoon or just to drop in for a hot drink and a biscuit. refreshments are free, and the 'comfy corner' has some comfortable armchairs waiting for you. (The Upper Trosnant Warm Space is run by members of the church, however, and if you would like somebody to pray with you, please do ask.)

The Upper Trosnant Warm Space is part of a nationwide network with venues open all across Britain. We regularly receive updates of Warm Space news, and recently were sent some simple knitting patterns for making cowls (also known as snoods or neck-warmers) that can be worn indoors or outdoors as an extra layer of comfort. These cosy garments were designed by a crafting group called Bee Creative, which meets at Frodsham in Cheshire.

The patterns are printed on the next page. There are three variations, and each one can be made from one 100g ball of chunky yarn. If you use a larger size needle than recommended, you will get an even softer, cosier texture.

The 3 stitch garter band on either side helps the cowl to lie flat when finished.

If you are a skilled knitter these will not take you long to complete, and they can be given as lovely gifts to friends, family or visitors to Warm Space. If you are a beginner, these are easy patterns to try. And if you have never knitted but would like to learn, please do ask one of the ladies at Warm Space or Open House to teach you!

Cosy Chunky Cowl Patterns



Pattern 1

Using 12mm needles, cast on 20 stitches.

Row 1: K3 (K2, P2) to last three stitches,

K3.

Row 2: K to end.

Repeat these two rows, allowing enough yarn at the end to cast off loosely.

The finished piece should measure about 30" (76cm), though length is not critical.

With a large sewing needle, slip stitch the ends together into a circle. Your cowl is now complete!

Pattern 2

Using 12mm needles, cast on 20sts.

Row 1: K3 (K2, P2) to last three stitches, K3.

Row 2: K3 (P2, K2) to last three stitches, K3.

Repeat these two rows 3 more times (8

rows).

Row 9: K3 (P2, K2) to the last three stitches,

K3.

Row 10: K3 (K2, P2) to last three stitches, K3.

Repeat rows 9 and 10 three more times (8 rows).

These 16 rows form the pattern. Repeat rows 1-16 four times more (total 5 patterns).



Repeat the first 8 rows once more.

Cast off loosely.

With a large sewing needle, slip stitch the ends together into a circle. Your cowl is now complete!

Pattern 3



With 12mm needles, cast on 23sts.

Row 1: K3, (P2, K3) 3 times, P2, K3.

Row 2: K5, P3, K2, P3, K2, P3, K5.

These two rows form a chunky rib pattern. Continue these two rows until the cowl measures about 30", ending with row 2 and leaving enough yarn to cast off.

Cast off loosely.

With a large sewing needle, slip stitch the ends together into a circle. Your cowl is now complete!

'For I know the Plans I have for you, plans to Prosper not to harm you', says the Lord

The Upper Trosnant 'verse for 2025' is Jeremiah 29:11, 'For I know the plans I have for you, says the Lord, plans to prosper not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future.' As Christians, we believe that all of the Bible is inspired by God, and that the promises that he gave to his people in the Old Testament are still true for us, his people today. This verse is one that we can hold to while we wait on the Lord as to the future direction and pastorate of our Church. It is also wonderfully comforting and reassuring to know that we can trust in the Lord's plans for u s individually, even when we go through difficult times. However

it is always important to know the historical context of verses from the Old Testament when we rely on the promises they hold. Jeremiah was a prophet bringing a message from God, but when did he live, and what situation were the Jewish people in at this time? If we understand the background then we can be sure of exactly what God's promise meant then, and what it means today.

Jeremiah lived between approximately 650 and 570 BC. He was called by the Lord to be a prophet at a time when the Jewish people were sinning greatly against God's ways, and Jeremiah brought them many warnings to repent and turn back to him. His prophesies were ignored, and as a punishment, in about 595 BC many of the Jews were taken as captives to Babylon. Jeremiah's prophetic warnings make up the 24th book of the Old Testament, and he was also the author of the following book, Lamentations, which tells of the people's grief living in exile far away from their homeland.

Jeremiah chapter 29 was written at a time when the prophet was still in Jerusalem, and it contains a prophesy in the form of a letter which he wrote to the elders, priests and people who had been deported. If we read Chapter 28 we learn what had happened just before this prophesy. A false prophet named Hananiah had been telling the people what they wanted to hear, and promising that their exile would be over very quickly. This was not true, and through Jeremiah, God warned Hananiah that he would be struck down, which is exactly what happened at the end of Chapter 28. Jeremiah's letter brought God's real message to the people, and it was not what they wanted to hear. They were to remain as captives for several generations, for 70 years in total. However, he would not forget them, and he had plans for their future prosperity, knowing that they would eventually turn back to him once more.

What then does 'our' verse mean for us today? God does not promise instant results, or that we will never face difficulty or hardship. Rather that as we follow him, he will prosper and bless us as we serve him in our current situation. We have a hope, and a future!

I will **gather** you from all the **nations** and **places** where I have **banished** you," declares the LORD, "and will bring you back to the place from which I carried you into exile." 
Bible Notes (46) Percussion Instruments in the Bible

The Bible doesn't mention drums as we think of them. Israelites used tambourines, cymbals and castanets. The tambourine dates back to 1700BC and is famous in Exodus 15:1-20 in Miriam's Song to celebrate the Israelites exodus from Egypt and crossing the Red Sea. Miriam first appears in the Book of Exodus. She is the daughter of Amram and Jochebed and the older sister of Moses and Aaron according to Numbers 26:59. Miriam is believed to have helped rescue her baby brother Moses from the River Nile

in Exodus 2:4

The tambourine is instruments in one, with a drum head made with stretched animal skin over a wooden frame. Within the frame are mounted metal jingles called zills. The instrument can be struck, as a drum, shaken or both actions at the same time.



The Salvation Army is known for it's music and the tambourine was ideal for a marching band. When the tambourine was first used it became very popular; easy to play and lively in action. The War Cry of 7th October, 1882, noted that 1,600 tambourines had been sold in six weeks. William Goddard designed a tambourine in 1893 that was better suited to Corps band needs. The tambourine that is used today in Salvation Army Bands hasn't changed significantly since the original design by Goddard.

A famous player was 'Tambourine Lizzie'. When she converted and became a Soldier, the Captain, who had heard of Lizzie's accomplishments on the tambourine, asked her if she would . . .

... join the drummers. Soon Londoners became accustomed to the sight of a dark, vivacious woman marching in Army processions, and playing a tambourine as if her life depended upon it. 'Tambourine Lizzie', became an Officer and married a Scottish Captain in the Corps. According to the War Cry, New York, Lizzie played a tambourine solo at her own wedding.

There are seventeen Bible verses referring to tambourines.

Cymbals were of cast bronze, although they could be worked from sheet material and in modern times are spun. Most often played in pairs; they can be clapped together or clashed one cymbal against another. An

An individual cymbal can be mounted on a stand and struck with a drum stick.

Psalm 150:5 'Praise him upon the loud cymbals: praise him upon the high sounding cymbals'. 1 Cor. 13:1 'Though I speak with the tongues of men and of angels, and have not charity, I am become as sounding brass, or a tinkling cymbal'.

Castanets consists of a pair of concave shells joined on one edge by a string. They are held in the hand and used to produce clicks for rhythmic accents They are traditionally made of chestnut, but in Bible times, ivory and metal were used.

'David and the entire assembly of Israel were dancing in the presence of the LORD with all of their strength, accompanied by all sorts of wooden instruments, harps, tambourines, castanets, and cymbals'. 2 Samuel 6:5

<u>Jimmy Carter 1924 – 2024</u>

'Jesus Christ is a person and to me a constant companion' – the words of Jimmy Carter of his deeply personal Christian faith. At his funeral, his grandson said, 'From the time he wakes to when he lays his head down, he walks with the Lord.' And it can be seen in all he did, whether as a Sunday School teacher, peanut farmer, naval officer or President of the United States - he was a born again Christian. Baptised when he was eleven at the Maranatha Baptist Church in Plains, Georgia, Jimmy Carter said that his conversion was over a number of years.



Carter was educated at the United States Naval Academy and graduated in 1946. After two years, he applied for submarine service and was assigned to work with the new nuclear submarine force. As Carter was preparing to become the engineering officer on USS Seawolf, one of the first submarines to operate on atomic power, his father died in July 1953. He was honourably discharged and returned home to manage the family business.



He was three years old when he met his wife, Rosalynn Smith, as a baby. His mother, Lilian, had helped deliver her as the families were close neighbours in Plains. They were married in 1946 and celebrated their 77th wedding anniversary in July 2023, before Rosalynn's death in November that same the longest-married year. They were Presidential couple in US history. Jimmy Carter said at her death: 'Rosalynn was my partner in everything I egual accomplished. She gave me wise guidance and encouragement when I needed it. As

long as Rosalynn was in the world, I always knew somebody loved and supported me.' One of the first stands he took was on segregation. He opposed a resolution by his local Baptist Church that prevented black worshippers from entering the church. While in the Navy, in 1950, when his submarine landed in the Bahamas, only white crew members were invited to a Christmas party, so Carter refused to

attend in support of his black

colleagues.

James Earl Carter became the 39th President of the United States on the 20th January 1977. He came to office amid an array of foreign and economic problems. Bringing peace to the Middle East was an outstanding achievement. He believed that the re-established nation of Israel in 1948 fulfilled biblical prophecies.



When the Egyptian President Anwar Sadat made his visit to Jerusalem in November 1977, this was followed by the reciprocal visit of Prime Minister Menachem Begin to Egypt. Jimmy Carter invited both these leaders to the presidential retreat at Camp David.

President Carter was awarded his Nobel Peace Prize in 2002. During the award ceremony, he said, 'I worship Jesus Christ, who we Christians consider the Prince of Peace.' He acknowledged that war may sometimes be necessary but is always evil. He said, 'We will not learn how to live together in peace by killing each other's children.'

He founded a nonprofit organisation based at the Carter Centre in Atlanta. The centre worked on critical areas of peace-making and human rights. He used the Carter Centre to bring people together from all sides of a conflict.

BMS World Mission Day of Prayer

On **Sunday 2 February**, churches across Great Britian will be joining in a united 'day of prayer' all praying at different times throughout the day, praying for particular needs highlighted by BMS workers around the world. At Upper Trosnant on that day, Sunday@Four will be a special BMS Prayer Meeting, and our BMS representative, Jill, will be sharing some slides and guiding us through the prayer requests.

Please do come if you can. Here are some needs to pray for at home, and to remind you to continue lifting these places and people in prayer throughout the month ahead. The Vision Statement of the BMS is that 'Together, we are working for a world where all can experience faith in Christ and the abundant life only he provides.' The BMS has partners in Europe, South America, Africa, and across Asia.

- In Cambodia, Pastor J says, 'most churches are struggling. Pray for the young people staying at a Baptist hostel for college students. Pray that God will provide land or a building for a mission centre that can be used as a training centre, a place of worship and as a guest house.'
- A native of **Brazil**, Lucia Bastos is working in **Chad**, where the infant mortality rate is 66 out of every 1000. (In Brazil it is 13; in the UK, it is 3.9.) She asks for prayer for the staff at Guinebor II Hospital, where they work to build healthier communities.
- In **Lebanon**, BMS partners are serving and supporting refugees who have fled the conflict in the Middle East.
- In Uganda, pray for Valerie Kisaber, from Kenya, who says 'all I aspire
 to do is to spread the love of Jesus to the Acholi people. I want to see
 parents raise their children in God-fearing homes, and also to sensitise
 communities to the dangers of gender-based violence, for that is not what
 God desires for families that he so loves and created.' Pray for justice for
 victims of violence.
- In Peru, Laura-Lee Lovering says, 'Since my teenage years, I suspected
 that inadequate management of natural resources was a significant
 contributor to a lot of human suffering around the world. When I became
 a Christian, the connection between loving one's neighbour and being a
 good steward of God's good creation seemed clear.' Pray for greater
 empathy and action to help.

PRAYER PAGE: Praying in the Snow!

Many of us felt discombobulated by suddenly finding we couldn't get to church on the first Sunday in January, on account of the snow. It can be frightening to feel trapped at home, and a great discouragement not to be able to meet with others for worship and fellowship. But let us take comfort in knowing that God is never taken by surprise — 'Have you entered the storehouses of the snow?', he declared to Job (Job 38:22). So how can we pray when snow disrupts our lives again? For it will!

Thank God for the snow, remembering that it is part of his wonderful creation. Isaiah 55:10 says, 'As the rain and the snow come down from heaven [they] do not return to it without watering the earth and making it bud and flourish.' Without winter, we would not have spring.

Share the joy that children get from playing in snow. Some of us may no longer be up to making snowballs and snowmen, but as Jesus told his followers, "Truly I tell you, unless you change and become like little children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven." (Matthew 18:2) Take time to marvel at an intricate snowflake on the window, or listen to the awesome silence of a snowy street.

Thank God for his care and protection, and let us count our blessings — including our homes, warm clothes, hot food, and telephones. Isaiah 25:4 reminds us that God is always 'a refuge for the poor, a refuge for the needy in their distress, a shelter from the storm.'

Let us pray that our plans are at the centre of God's will. As Proverbs 19:21 says, 'Many are the plans in a person's heart, but it is the Lord's purpose that prevails.' When we are prevented from our usual activities, let us ask him what he would have us be doing instead. Just as in the covid lockdowns, we can redouble our efforts to support and pray for one another. Ask the Lord who you can help when it snows, whether with some shopping, a visit, or a telephone call.

And finally, **ask the Lord to give you an opportunity to share the good news of Jesus**, whether face to face, talking on the phone, or via text or social media. Isaiah 18:1 is a good verse to share when the weather is bad, 'Though your sins are like scarlet, they shall be as white as snow.'
